**C. Funding issues that affected the SWMD's operations during the report year or new issues anticipated to affect the SWMD:**

Overall revenue to the district dropped 3.3% in 2009 from 2008 and will probably continue to decrease somewhat with tonnages of waste disposed continuing to decline given the effects from the current recession. The district forecast lower contract fees in its 2009 budget versus 2008 by \$78,140 and lowered the 2010 fee amount by an additional \$32,000 to better reflect what it felt actual fee income will be on current disposal levels.

Additionally the amount of support budgeted for the district's MRF has decreased by \$21,700 from 2008 to 2009 and by \$47,725 from 2009 to 2010 to reflect the maximum amount of support available from the district's budget. Historically the maximum amount has not been needed or used, including in 2009, due to the MRF's total budgeted expenses not being used, and with the exception of 2009, sales of materials from the MRF exceeding budget projections.

Commodity prices continued to increase after mid year 2009 from their unprecedented declines in late 2008 and early 2009, and continue to move upward.

The MRF completed operational changes and staff reductions in 2009 that lowered the 2010 budget for core expenses, exclusive of amounts allocated for material buyback, to a level that was \$25,000 less than what was spent for those expenses in 2009. Keeping expenses in line with conservative revenue projections will allow the district and MRF to continue to provide valuable recycling and waste management services to the county with the exception of the HHW/Paint collection. As operations continue to improve, the HHW program will be reinstated possibly as a year around service instead of one annual event.

**D. Significant changes in revenue and/or expenditures from Plan projections:**

Provide a brief explanation if revenue and expenditures for the report year deviated significantly from those projected in the SWMD's currently approved Plan.

Revenues were \$179,800 and expenditures were \$113,495 less than plan projections for 2009. All revenue categories were less than plan budget: Generation/Contract fees (\$40,668); Contract Services (\$29,132); Grants (\$51,204); Sales (\$45,911) and Other Revenue (\$12,887). All expense categories were less than plan budget except: Workers Comp (+\$239); Unemployment (+\$17,949); Repairs (+\$17,096); Fuel (+\$3,774) and Material Buyback (+\$30,632). Wages (-\$35,546) & Personnel Costs (-\$33,353) were less due to staff reductions as a result of the slow economy/recession. Those cuts drove unemployment costs way over plan budget. Contract Service (-\$3,255); Supplies (-\$2,157); Equipment (-\$15,690); Travel (-\$3,043); advertising (-\$6,482); Miscellaneous (-\$12,361); HHW (-\$16,778) and Utilities (-\$5,778) were all less due to less activity and reductions in spending made due to impending decreased revenues. Fuel was over budget \$3,774 - it is hard to estimate that type cost five years in advance. Grant disbursements were \$48,505 less than budget because the amount forecast in the plan used to be a set amount based on population and all we had to do was apply. But the funding criteria changed to a competitive format and required new or expanded programs and the district did not have need for more than \$8,095 for projects that fit the criteria. Repairs were over the plan budget by \$17,096. Volume increases in 2005 - 2008 totaling 27% put a lot of wear and tear on equipment which as it ages requires more repair and maintenance. Material Buyback remains over budget, and will continue to, due to increased volume and the district's aggressive pricing strategies to attract more non-ferrous material from local businesses, contractors and residents rather than have the material go to scrap dealers in neighboring counties.
